Sixteen Days in Bhutan: St. Michael's Students and Professors Work with Bhutanese Youth to Develop Media Education Projects

Bhutan, having only recently opened itself up to the West, struggles to maintain its identity as a small Buddhist Himalayan Kingdom in the face of increasing exposure to a globalized media. Over the recent winter break, a group of SMC students in the interdisciplinary anthropology/journalism course *Youth, Media and Development* traveled to Bhutan under the guidance of Professors Jon Hyde and Adrie Kusserow to explore the impact of mass media on youth in developing nations. The group worked collaboratively with the Bhutan Centre for Media and Democracy to conduct media literacy workshops for Bhutanese students in high school media clubs from all over the country.
